## ROUND 4 REVIEW

## GRAND SLAM TRIPLE

Three English teams will head into the final round of RBS 6 Nations action in Ireland this weekend looking to win Grand Slams.

England's senior side, Under 20 and Women's teams have a perfect 12 out of 12 record in their Championships this season and the first opportunity to make a clean sweep will fall to Katy Mclean's side when they take on the Irish Women at Ashbourne at 7.30pm on Friday night. With Grand Slams in 2008 and 2010 England's Women certainly know how to deliver, while Alex Gray's Under 20 side will be seeking their first Grand Slam since 2008. They kick-off 15 minutes later than the women in Athlone on Friday night.

Two wins over the Irish on Friday would then put the pressure on Mike Tindall's team to end an eight year wait to England's 13th Championship Grand Slam.

JONNO POISED TO JOIN  
SPECIAL GRAND SLAM CLUB

Martin Johnson will join a very exclusive club if he can guide his England team to Grand Slam glory in Dublin this weekend.

Already recognised as one of the giants of the world game after a playing career that saw him lead the British & Irish Lions to a series win in South Africa and England to the Rugby World Cup in Australia, he is now poised to become only the sixth person to taste Grand Slam success as both a player and coach.

His two Grand Slam successes as a player came in the World Cup years of 1995 and 2003, the latter as captain, but he has also learned about the pain of falling at the final hurdle. England went into the final round of matches looking for the top honour in northern hemisphere rugby in 1999, 2000 and 2001 where Johnson captained the side in both 1999 against Wales in Wembley and 2001 against Ireland in Dublin.

Now he is aiming to double-up and join Wales' John Dawes, fellow Englishman Clive Woodward and the French trio of Jean-Claude Skrela, Jacques Fouroux and Marc Lievreumont in a very special Grand Slam 'Hall of Fame'.

## DUBLIN REVISITED

There have been 34 Grand Slams completed over the past 100 years in the Five and 6 Nations, with Wales completing the clean sweep of four matches in 1908 and 1909 before the Championship was formulated with five teams. But there have also been 21 failures at the final hurdle - 5 each by Ireland and England, 4 each by Scotland and France and 3 by Wales. England lead the way with 12 Grand Slams and their last success in 2003 came in the very city they will be travelling to this weekend seeking their 13th clean sweep. Dublin was the venue for a winner-takes-all Grand Slam shoot-out between two unbeaten teams eight years ago.

England came through in convincing style and scored five tries in the 42-6 demolition job on the Irish. There are still a few survivors from that occasion at the old Lansdowne Road. Brian O'Driscoll is still leading the Irish and will have Ronan O'Gara, Peter Stringer and Paul O'Connell alongside him in the home camp.

Current England skipper Mike Tindall, Jonny Wilkinson and Joe Worsley all featured in that game and Martin Johnson had his scrum coach Graham Rowntree with him in the England pack.
